

I. How did God use "Comparisons"? (1)

- God used them to show the different choices set before His people and the consequences of each of them.
 - Mount Ebal and Mount
 - Gerizim




I. How did God use "Comparisons"? (2)

- The Lord Christ used them in many parables:
 - The sower
 - The rich man and Lazarus
 - The wheat and the tares
 - The ten virgins
 - The lost son



I. How did God use "Comparisons"? (3)

 He used comparisons to defend the woman who poured the fragrant oil on His feet at the house of Simon the Pharisee and to praise the widow with the two mites



I. How did God use "Comparisons"? (4)

 The Lord Jesus used them also to illustrate the difference between His children and those of the world: "Behold, I send you out as sheep in the midst of wolves" *Matthew 10:16*



II. How did Satan use "Comparisons"? (1)

 To tempt Eve through a destructive ambition: "in the day you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God" *Genesis 3:5*



II. How did Satan use "Comparisons"? (2)

2. To underestimate God's work: "But Pharaoh also called the wise men and the sorcerers; so the magicians of Egypt, they also did in like manner with their enchantments...And Pharaoh's heart grew hard, and he did not heed them, as the LORD had said" *Exodus 7:11, 13*



II. How did Satan use "Comparisons"? (3)

- To deceive by offering an alternative:
 - Altar to Baal in Samaria
 - Money vs. God
 - False prophets and religions
 - Barabbas



III. How do we learn negative comparisons?


- Wrong motivational parenting style
- Lack of usage of the scale of measuring ourselves against the image and stature of the Lord Christ



IV. Outcomes of negative "Comparisons" (1)

1. Jealousy and Envy:

- Cain and Abel
- Joseph's brothers
- The impossibility of loving my
 neighbor as I love myself in the
 presence of these "comparisons"



IV. Outcomes of negative "Comparisons" (2)

2. False boastings:

The Pharisee and the Publican: "God,
I thank You that I am not like other
men - extortioners, unjust, adulterers,
or even as this tax collector"

Luke 18:11

- Boastings regarding possessions or

social status

IV. Outcomes of negative "Comparisons" (3)

Kindling the Spirit of Competition:
"So the women sang as they danced, and said: 'Saul has slain his thousands, And David his ten thousands.' Then Saul was very angry, and the saying displeased him"



1 Samuel 18:7-8

IV. Outcomes of negative "Comparisons" (4)

- 3. <u>Kindling the Spirit of Competition</u> (Cont.):
 - This will lead to refraining from
 offering help to those whom we
 perceive as rivals
 - Hypocrisy and cunning behavior
 - typically follow

4. Distraction from self-examination and

focusing on others' faults and

<u>shortcomings</u>



- 5. Using comparisons to justify ourselves:
 - "Everyone does the same"
 - "Why do you correct me while others

are doing the same?"

IV. Outcomes of negative "Comparisons" (6)

6. Acquiring low self-esteem and being

prepared for failure:

"There we saw the giants (the

descendants of Anak came from the





giants); and we were like grasshoppers

in our own sight, and so we were in

their sight." Numbers 13:33

IV. Outcomes of negative "Comparisons" (7)

7. <u>Accepting a deceiving reference</u>:

- To judge or justify ourselves
- To wrongly define what is good and evil



- To misunderstand others' faults and struggles

IV. Outcomes of negative "Comparisons" (8)

- 8. <u>Self-pity: a mother breeding evil</u>
 1) Complaining against God and
 others and absence of thanksgiving
 2) Negativity and self-centeredness
 3) Drowning in excuses
 - 4) Seeking others' sympathy at all

5) Avoiding self-examination and confession
6) Inability to take responsibility for own

actions

7) Tendency to sadness and surrendering

V. "Comparisons" as a virtue (2)

- Comparing my current status with a better one from the past:
 - First Love

The lost son: "How many of my father's hired servants have bread enough and to spare, and I perish with hunger!" Luke 15:17



V. "Comparisons" as a virtue (3)

- Comparing myself to those who were not given what I was granted
 - Thanksgiving
 - Sense of responsibility
 - Excusing others' faults
